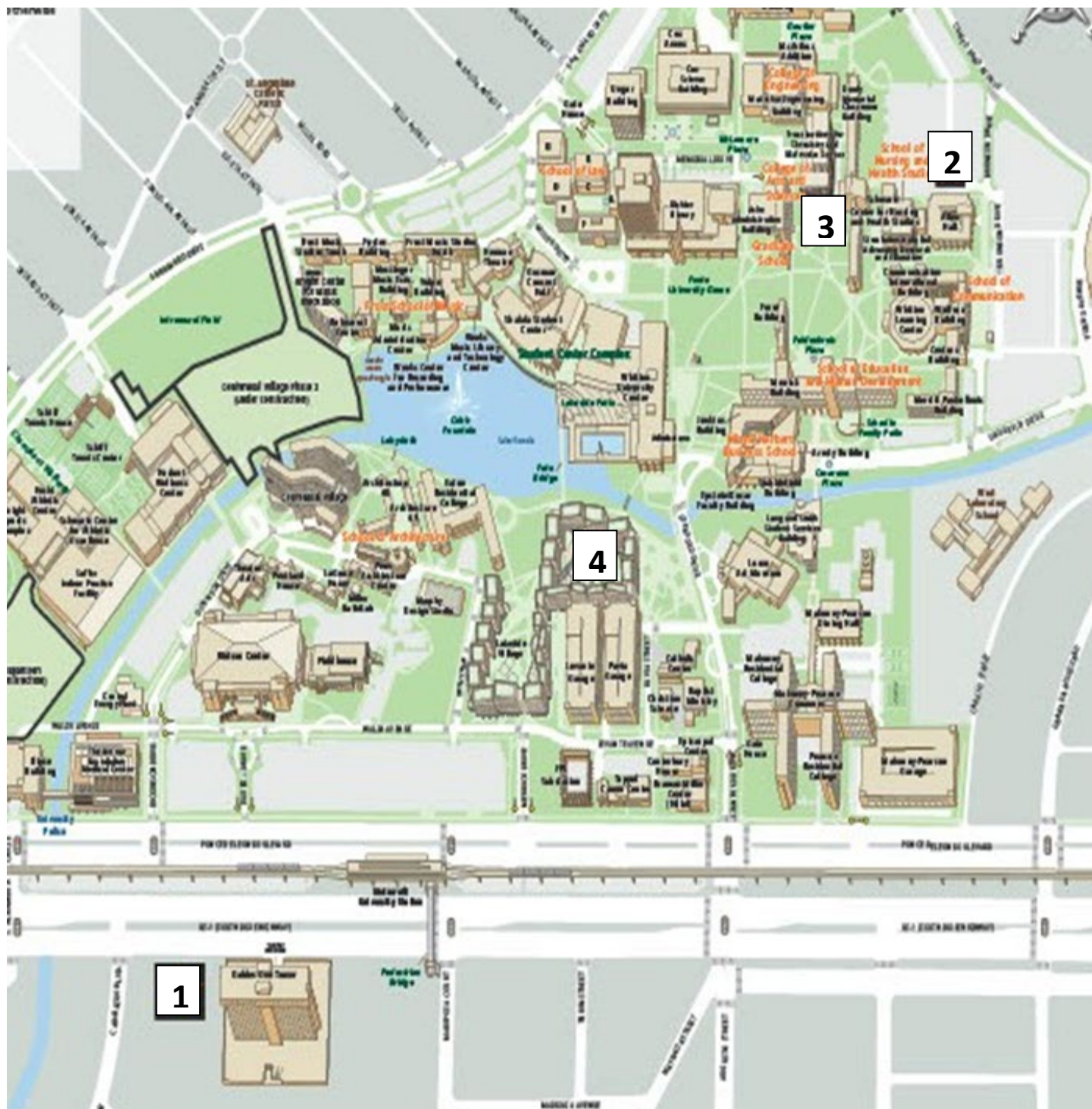

ALCOHOL ACTIONS ON THE BODY AND BRAIN

This session brings together cutting-edge research spanning the effects of alcohol from molecules to behavior. Presentations will highlight advances in understanding alcohol's impact on the brain, updates in clinical perspectives from NIAAA, and new insights into how alcohol metabolism across organs influences both drinking behavior and organ damage. STRESS ACROSS THE TRANSLATIONAL CONTINUUM – STRESS, COPING AND THE ENVIRONMENT

The session will bridge clinical, laboratory, and community perspectives to advance our understanding of stress and coping by exploring how trauma, pain, and systemic inequities intersect with mental health and substance use. Dr. Colin Mahoney will highlight disparities in trauma exposure, PTSD, and substance use disorders among racial and ethnic minority populations, emphasizing the protective role of social support and the need for culturally relevant clinical care. Dr. Robert L. Peralta will share findings on policing's impact in African American communities, showing how individuals use coping strategies, artistic expression, and resilience to navigate trauma and foster healing. Dr. Anel Jaramillo will present research on how stress increases anxiety, focusing on alcohol abstinence. Together, these talks illustrate the diverse ways that stress manifests across biological, psychological, and social contexts, while also emphasizing the importance of protective factors, community resilience, and culturally grounded approaches to care.
